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
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From the Vicarage Garden:

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I Hear Skylarks

Come with me as Dog and I take our usual daily walk late in May. Up West Hill from High Salvington Mill, past the little car park opposite Audrey's house, who with her family gave so much to St. Peter's church and garden, and along the rough track to the water reservoir and radio mast. On the way we check on the new oak seedling growing in the shadow of the dead old oak which I used to climb as a child. It is sad to see the old branches gaunt against the sky and to feel the ache in my joints which used to clamber so easily up them, but good to see the growth of new life and the fresh optimism of the new shoots and leaves.

A few steps further on and we are at one of the high points of the downs hereabouts. We pause to see across Findon Valley to Cissbury and Chanctonbury on one side, and across the great field of ripening barley to the Isle of Wight on the other. These are views which are always subtly different according to the weather, the light and the time of year, but always serene with a sense of openness and the breath of fresh air - somewhat too much fresh air when the south-west gales blow!

Today, as spring is beginning to turn to early summer, the air is warm and almost still, so in addition to the inspiring views we can stop and listen. There is a small aeroplane from Shoreham droning past, and the rumble of traffic on the Arundel road. Dogs bark down in Findon Valley, and someone calls from the field across the barley. Birds chatter in the small woodland near the car park.

There is one sound, though, that lifts the heart as no other can. I hear skylarks in the evening air. I can never see them; it is as though they come from invisible spirits dancing in the air above my head. There are two of them, duetting blithely, sweetly, lovingly - not loud, but piercing the soul with their simple confidence in life, with complete joy in the moment, God's own sopranos.

As we say at every eucharist: "We worship you. We give you thanks."

Dog has had his walk and lies content. I have had my spirit blessed, and give thanks.

Creating Bridges

We have all lived through stressful times and seen on TV awful scenes of suicide bombers and Grenfell Tower ablaze. Still it can be hard to grasp the enormity and complexity of the plight of refugees. Some have escaped from war in a too-small rubber boat, some are traumatised by sudden loss of loved ones, home and possessions, persecution in their homeland, or sexual assault and deprivation in a camp in another country. Other survivors may be amazingly courageous and resilient and deeply thankful for the possibility of a new life. After a tortuous wait in a detention centre for the processing of their application for refugee status, to be welcomed gladly is wonderful.

You may have read in a recent paper or the *Church Times* an article on offering hospitality to refugees in West Sussex. We all have different reactions to this news, maybe approval, but maybe some alarm, anxiety or even apathy.

Curious to know how Worthing was involved, I signed on for a Training Day in town last week. It was rather daunting to find that the majority of others attending were professionals with a wealth of experience already of working with distressed or traumatised refugees. A few had the added advantage of speaking several languages, including Arabic. Without exception they were all dedicated to their caring work and eager to share experiences and understanding on that day.

We listened to three excellent speakers who gave insights into the current situation and covered the vital issues that might arise. We looked at three case studies and were asked for suggestions as to how to help and how to avoid leading the refugees into re-living their dreadful experiences.

As we know from our links with the homeless ladies from the Marylebone Day Centre, every individual reacts differently to what is offered: some are quiet and some the opposite! The reward comes in knowing that each of us can make a difference simply by doing what we are most happy doing, be it preparing lunch, going to the beach or finding a way to communicate. We can look forward to meeting strangers and offering them a safe haven for the day in our small corner of Worthing.

Bed ... and if you are not ready for bed after this, you are a Duracell (there are other batteries on the market) bunny!



The worship and teaching 'sessions' were about an hour to an hour and a half long and the youth were captivated! Nothing was keeping them in the main worship tent apart from their wish to be there. This time would start with a few jokes, shout outs, and a game – a different one each time. Then there would be singing of worship songs (and if you didn't know these on the Friday, you jolly well did by the Monday!) The teaching was done by different people telling their faith journey and tying it in with a bible passage or several! You could hear a pin drop. These people were passionate about their faith and the youth respected and were inspired by that. Prayer and more singing followed.

Hang on a minute, I hear you cry. Why RUSH? Hebrews 12 starts like this

Do you see what this means – all these pioneers who blazed the way, all these veterans cheering us on? It means we'd better get on with it. Strip down, start running – and never quit! No extra spiritual fat, no parasitic sins. Keep your eyes on Jesus, who both began and finished this race we're in. Study how he did it. Because he never lost sight of where he was headed – that exhilarating finish in and with God – he could put up with anything along the way: cross, shame, whatever. And now he's there, in the place of honour, right alongside God. When you find yourselves flagging in your faith, go over that story again, item by item, that long litany of hostility he plowed through. That will shoot adrenaline into your souls! (12:1-3 the Message)

We all need a RUSH of adrenaline occasionally to give us a burst of energy. But we also need to keep exercising and to keep fit in between times, by reading our Bible and sharing with others the way that God has acted or spoken to us in our lives. .



Stringhenge: Acoustic Music Inspired by the British Isles – Chichester



Richard Durrant's latest musical adventure will feature the Uffington Tenor Guitar*, built in Sussex, and a six string Concert Guitar*, built in Lincolnshire and made from 5,000 year old bog oak. This show is a uniquely British exploration of unplugged, acoustic music on the folk/classical cusp.

Stringhenge is as beautifully produced and richly visual as any of Durrant's tours of recent years. Its also unplugged allowing you to hear and feel the vibrations of the wood in these incredible guitars. Durrant plays them brilliantly and is a clever weaver of intriguing tales. It's real roots music linking the neolithic to the 21st century.

The Durrant originals written for this tour draw inspiration from the hill barrows of Sussex, the flatlands of East Anglia and the mountains of Cumbria. Other pieces are chosen from eleven centuries of music with more than a smattering of JS Bach reworked from Durrant's unique perspective.

Is there anything you would like to do? Read on and reflect there are many roles from which to choose!

Church Wardens

Historically the parish has been well served by a succession of dedicated Church Wardens who have each given of their unique skills to fulfil the role on our behalf. Currently, we are supported by Sheila Payne and Christine Parkin who have worked unflinchingly and to whom we remain grateful. There will come a time soon when they will understandably need to step aside as Church Wardens so we must be prepared. As part of that process we need to clarify what the role entails so that we can plan effectively for their successors.

Each year at the APCM two Church Wardens are elected to serve the needs of the parish by the people who belong to the parish through their membership on the electoral roll. The Church Wardens are elected FROM the people, BY the people, to work WITH the people in supporting worship, fellowship and mission FOR the parish and its community networks. This is a representative role on behalf of the parish church and the Diocesan Bishop. It is a position of trust and carries authority vested by the Bishop via his licence.

There are two elected Church Wardens who work together, bringing their respective gifts to the role. They in turn work as a part of the Parish Team with the PCC, Administrator and Priest in charge regarding organisation of the parish and facilitate the activity of the Worship Team. This is therefore a TEAM ministry reliant on a diversity of complementary skills, time and resourcefulness.

Church Wardens aim to: Be a bridge between the Diocese and the parish, the congregation and the PCC, the church and the community; Understand the needs of the local congregation and community; Support the parish as it seeks to implement the PCC mission action plan

So, what does this mean that they actually do?

Get to know members of the Parish Team and Worship Team
Be a member of the PCC and standing committee
Liaise with Priest-in-charge and Administrator
Attend Sunday worship regularly in rotation with other Church Warden /
Vergers

Be a point of contact for the parish Keep a finger on the pulse of parish life Be mindful of the pastoral needs of the parish Keep an eye on the state of the church buildings Encourage and support social and fundraising events

What does it mean more specifically for Worship?

Church Wardens facilitate the **Worship Team** comprising of **verger**, **sacristan**, **sides people** and **worship leaders**, ensuring that everything is in place for each worship event.

Verger: Vergers will be appointed by the PCC to undertake the practical aspects of church worship events. The verger is a key holder who arrives half an hour before a service starts to carry out the following duties: Unlocks church and hall; Puts out welcome board; Checks heating and lights; Checks furniture is in right place; Switches on microphones; Unlocks organ; Puts on water heater in kitchen vestry; Gets out bags for offertory; Counts and records numbers in attendance; Ensures church is tidy at end of service; Reverses checks for heating, lights etc. and locks up.

This role is vital to the smooth running of our worship and we are planning to develop a team of vergers over this year. We are indebted to David Milner and Helen Van Helden who have pioneered aspects this role thus far and who will be on hand as mentors for the new team alongside Sheila Payne and Christine Parkin


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Sides people: Sides people are elected at the APCM and play a vital role in welcoming the folk who come to church. They need to be in place at least 20 minutes before a service starts so they can be prepared to offer a calm and focused welcome to those who come through the door. Their list of duties include: Put out hymn books, orders of service, pew sheets; Put up hymn numbers; Welcome people as they arrive; Help people to find a seat; Introduce new people and visitors to Warden; Liaise with Warden about taking the elements and the offertory; Lock side door to vestry when service starts; Help people at chancel steps at Communion; Clear away books at end of service; Count and record collection. We are grateful to all our sides people and look forward to welcoming new members to join the team. **Sacristan:** The senior sacristan at All Saints is Diane Perle who faithfully ensures that all is ready for our services including the 8.30am, 10am and weekday services. The following is a sample of the duties involved: Ensures altar cloths and linen are cleaned and ready; Ensures oil, wine, hosts are in plentiful supply; Orders seasonal items – e.g advent candles, paschal candles; Prepares altar, pulpit and lectern with liturgical colours; Checks oil candles; Unlocks safe; Prepares credence table with silver and everything for Eucharist; Places host, wine and water ready for offertory procession; Clears away at the end of the service.

Worship leaders: Worship is a corporate activity which involves all of us working together. The term Liturgy means the work of the people! There is inevitably a team of people who lead and hold us together in our endeavours to praise and worship God. This includes the following - Priest, Preacher, Intercessor, Lectors, Lay Readers, Lay Ministers of Communion, Choir, Organist/Pianist, Servers – who seamlessly mesh together their skills and giftings into the tapestry which is our worship.

And let's not forget the support team: Flower arrangers, cleaners, coffee makers, washer-uppers, cake suppliers, gardeners, pastoral visitors, magazine collators and distributors

And above all – those who pray for the life and work of this parish community.


